WHAT IS REALLY HAPPENING BEHIND THE CLOSED DOORS OF COUPLES, THAT MAY SEEM PERFECT?

HOW CAN WE DESCRIBE DOMESTIC VIOLENCE?

Domestic violence is a type of violence, occurring¹ between close people sharing the same household. It is a type of relationship between a rapist² and a victim³. The rapist usually takes the advantage to hold power over the victim. This type of violence is usually commited⁴ on a partner, but it can also be performed on children, parents or other members of the same household.

KINDS OF DOMESTIC VIOLENCE

The victim can **perambulate**⁵ several types of domestic violence: physical (beating, choking, cutting, denying food and sleep,...), psychological, social, sexual and economic abuse.

WHAT WE CANNOT SEE BUT OTHERS FEEL?

Domestic violence is not generally noticeable, because it is commonly being performed in private. That is one of the main reasons, why the victim is afraid of talking and bringing this subject up. The victim can also be **frightened**⁶ about reporting the rapist and the consequences it may cause.

SIGNS OF DOMESTIC VIOLENCE

Domestic violence can be recognized in early stages. The violence repeats itself and it happens on a long term. You cannot identify if you are being a victim of domestic violence from a single attack⁷, but it can be just the beginning of serious attacks. The attacks may escalate⁸ soon and you will be able to identify

who the victim is and who the abuser⁹ is in the conflicts.

WHY IS THE VICTIM STAYING?

Walk away from the abuser? It is martyrdom¹⁰ for abused people.

A lot of people can be asking themselves why the victim is staying! Why cannot they leave? Well, it is not as easy as it may appear to be.

Many victims don't want to admit that they are victims at all. They are also frightened of what awaits them; unpleasant police **interrogations**¹¹, lengthy court **proceedings**¹², visiting social workers and psychologists. All of this takes a long period of time and the end is out of sight so the victim cannot get rid of the problem immediately. It is demanding and time-consuming. **Thus**¹³, many women change their mind about leaving a violent partner and decide to stay in the same household with him.

It can also be harder for the victim to leave the abuser when children are included.

The victim may worry about their finances, background, their health and health of their children, **BUT REMEMBER...**

RIHANNA
